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## Theme Analysis of *The Great Gatsby*

Money is everything to everyone, society makes you feel worthless, if you are not wealthy.. With all the parties, fancy clothes, and fancy houses, the higher class thinks that they have everything. Everyone is so happy, at least that's what Nick thinks, "Her voice is full of money, he said suddenly. That was it. I'd never understood before. It was full of money-that was the inexhaustible charm that rose and fell in it, the jingle of it, the cymbals' song of it." But, what he doesn't see is all the scandals that occur on the other side of every closed door, the yelling and fighting in the next room that is muffled by the noise of the parties, or the pain of still not being happy after everything that they have. In *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald, you will find the main theme is that money doesn't always buy you happiness.

Gatsby had everything, the big parties, the fancy clothes and the fancy house, and everything in it. Nick looked at Gatsby and thought that he had everything, he thought that he was the happiest man alive, until he asked about his money. "I lived like a young rajah in all the capitals of Europe –Paris, Venice, Rome- collecting jewels, chiefly rubies, hunting big game, painting a little, things for myself only, and trying to forget something very sad that happened to me a long time ago" (Fitzgerald 65-66). When Gatsby's family died he inherited a "great deal of money" (Fitzgerald 65), and went around wasting his money on superficial items that might

make him happy. When the war came around, he actually tried to get killed, because he had nothing to return to but money.

Everything seemed perfect, it was a wonderful party, everyone was happy. But if everyone became quiet then you could hear what was really happening. Nick didn't know about the pain that happened in these people's lives, he didn't know what was really happening behind all of the closed doors. "Beat me!" he heard her cry, "throw me down and beat me, you dirty little coward!" (Fitzgerald 137). "Can't repeat the past?...Why of course you can!" (Fitzgerald 117). He learned from Gatsby that happiness doesn't come from money but the people that you love. There will always be
